<u>MEETING MINUTES:</u> There was a nice turnout for the meeting at our new location with first time attendees Mark Walters, James Colgrove, and Larry Hardester welcomed to the meeting.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Treasurer, Kelly Faust read the Treasurer's Report and it was accepted as read.

JUNE MEETING: I will not be at the June meeting, so Kelly and Bill will be filling in so if some of you can help them out, that would be great. Kelly will be covering the results of the Special Hunt and the Spring Hunt, will cover other topics related to metal detecting, and is open to other informative stories from members who have something to share.

MAY MEETING: St. Louis County Historian, Esley Hamilton, gave a very informative presentation on the history of St. Louis County

parks at the May meeting. He did a PowerPoint slide show covering every park in St. Louis County telling about who donated the land, how the park got its name, where it is located, and much more information. Some of these parks contain homes or other structures dating back to the 1800's. Mr. Hamilton described various features pertaining to each of the parks which make them popular to visitors. He told us that there are 72 parks occupying 24,000 acres located throughout the county. While we all know about Forest Park in the city and how large it is, we were told Greensfelder Park is larger. White Haven Park contains a home previously occupied by Ulysses S. Grant, and Ebsworth Park in Kirkwood holds a home designed and built by Frank Lloyd Wright. A lot of good information was provided during this presentation and members asked some good questions that Mr. Hamilton as county historian answered with ease.

NEW MEETING LOCATION: The May club meeting on at the St. Louis County Library-Rock Road worked out great for our first meeting. I want to thank those who helped set up the room (which really was quite minimal compared to our old location), those that helped with the raffle ticket sales, and the clean-up and carry out of the equipment when we left.

SPECIAL HUNT RESULTS: A special hunt was held on May 21ST at the Every Child's Hope facility located at 8240 St. Charles Rock Road. The site dates back to 1858 so members were excited to get the opportunity to metal detect there. The weather was great and a larger than expected turn-out resulted. Within moments of getting started A. J. Phillips and his son Zach recovered a Shield nickel dated 1867. As the day went along, finds included Indian Cents from the 1800's and early 1900's, Mercury dimes and Roosevelt dimes were found, quite a few wheat cents, and, as usual, a large number of modern and clad coins were pulled from the ground. Some rings including gold and sterling silver came to see the light of day for the first time in a long time as well as a few jewelry items, oddities, tokens, and quite a bit of trash items including the typical pull tabs. It is hoped that all who participated enjoyed the chance to hunt such a site and went home

with a least a few "treasures". It is appreciated how all acted in a "professional manner" by filling all holes and removing all dua trash and disposing of it properly. Kelly will give a more detailed report at the June meeting of the finds made based on a summary of what was reported back to me by our members. I have also put together a letter to the Director of the facility, Mr. Mike Brennan thanking him for the opportunity to hunt the site along with the summary of finds. A big thanks goes to club members Tim McNiff and Carl Boekemier for their participation in giving a presentation to some of the boys who live at this facility and especially Tim for his work in setting up this whole endeavor and making it possible.

SPRING HUNT RESULTS: The Spring Hunt on May 22nd was held at Benton Park with seventeen members participating. The participation was a bit lower than expectedperhaps everyone was worn down from the day-long special hunt just the day before. The hunt went from about 8:00 AM to about 2:00 PM and silver halves and quarters were awarded for various categories of finds made. Twelve members reported their total money finds which came to \$26.23 from 383 coins found. The most valuable coin ended up being a 1962 Roosevelt dime, and the oldest coin was a 1919 cent. Prizes were also awarded for the oldest individual coins, most coins found, best jewelry, and best oddity. I arrived early and buried a special metal object which was good for a silver Kennedy half dollar figuring that as the day went along someone would surely find it and turn it in. That did not happen. After lunch, I told those still hunting the general direction to where it was buried and they headed out to find. After some amount of time and no success. I narrowed down the location and it was finally discovered by Christine Zika. She also won a prize for a jewelry item she founda rather ornate cross. A man passing through the park stopped and asked if anyone had found an ornate cross that his wife had lost about three weeks previously. When Christine showed us her cross find, we told her about the man's loss. He later stopped back and Christine showed him the cross, and he told her that it was not the one he lost.
